# Online Rules to Live By:

#### Do not accept all friend requests.

The purpose of facebook and other social networking sites is to connect with people you know. But not all friend requests are legitimate. Accepting a friend request from someone you don't know could be potentially harmful.

## Be careful of what you post on your wall.

Web transmissions aren't foolproof unless they use secure forms of authentication and encryption, Posting something online is just as open and available to others as posting something on your door. So always think twice before posting!
